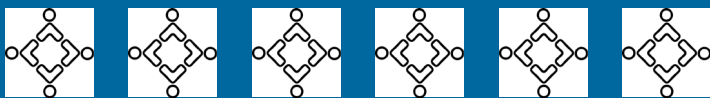

Project Ideas



Help pay for a stranger's groceries.



Provide a meal for Saddleback BBQ employees who have served throughout COVID by providing food to SummerPlace and Gardner.



Bless some of Trinity's elderly/shut-in folks by meeting a practical need and/or sending a note of encouragement.



Serve an individual or family a meal or fill their freezer and/or pantry with groceries.



Adopt a widow - develop a lasting relationship with one of Trinity's widows, or a widow in your neighborhood.



Collect new or gently used, basic tools such as hammers, tape measures, screw drivers, and pliers. Fill six toolboxes to be delivered to refugee families.



Pay for and pump gas at a local gas station.



Do yardwork or shovel snow for a widow, a single mom, or a family who is struggling.



Spend a Saturday morning sprucing up the yard of someone you know who could use the encouragement. Bring a few tools along and do any small, outdoor repairs you could do while you're there.

Project Ideas



Deliver goodie bags filled with treats and small gifts to the hard-working *Health Care Heroes* at a local hospital or Urgent Care who are dealing with COVID. Consider including protein bars, a water bottle, lip balm, unscented hand lotion, hand sanitizer, candy, gum, a deck of cards or a small game, a gift card for Starbucks, or other items in the bag.



Create a dozen blessing bags to deliver to one of the homeless shelters. Include items such as Meijer gift cards, new underwear or socks, snacks, winter gloves, hats or ear muffs, wipes, toothbrush and toothpaste, bandaids, a note of encouragement expressing Jesus' love for them, or anything else you think of.



Deliver two weeks of homemade freezer meals, a week of carryout food, or a basket containing two weeks worth of groceries to a family facing illness or unemployment. Tuck in some notes of encouragement. Tell the family you'll pray for them and check in on them later - then do it.



Encourage the hard-working staff at your favorite nonprofit agency by dropping off some treats, small gifts, and notes of appreciation to them, recognizing they serve our community all year long.

Adopt a family in need at Reo School, providing Christmas food and gifts.

Project Ideas



Take a care package to a teacher or several teachers. Include items such as coffee mugs and gourmet coffee or tea, chocolates, bath bombs, a restaurant gift card, hand sanitizer and lotion, or notes of encouragement.



Provide a lunch or dinner for the staff at a small organization, or in one department of a larger one. Make it homemade or cater it. Include a bag of Christmas cookies for each worker to take home.



Provide Amazon gift cards for a single parent to use to buy Christmas gifts for his or her kids. Give him or her one large gift card or a separate one to shop for each child. Include a special gift card for the single parent to pick out something for himself/herself. Tuck in a note of encouragement for him/her and a few Christmas decorations for their home.



Buy winter coats, boots, hats, and mittens for every member of a family in need. Talk to the parent or caregiver and get sizes and color preferences. Deliver as early as possible so they can get the most use out of them this winter!

Purchase a gift for a child whose parent is incarcerated through Celebrate Recovery's Angel Tree project, or help out at their Angel Tree Party. [\(see page 13\)](#)

Project Ideas



Create a holiday movie night kit for a widow, a single person who lives alone, a family who needs to feel loved, or for the women and children at the City Rescue Mission's Maplewood Center. Pack some good, wholesome DVDs, microwave popcorn, 2-liters of pop, and candies into a gift basket. If you're providing for one person or for a family, add a cozy fleece throw or two. For the Mission, add enough warm, colorful fleece socks to give a pair to each guest to keep her feet warm while she watches movies. Write out a Christmas card with prayers for 2021 and slip that into your basket, too!



Adopt a family – Provide Christmas for a family in need. Either shop for the parent and caregiver, or give the parent or caregiver gift cards to purchase gifts for the children. If you purchase gifts, wrap them up and deliver them close to Christmas. If you give gift cards, add festive wrapping paper, tape, and bows to drop off to the family so that the shopper can do his or her own wrapping. Toss in a gas card and a gift card for Biggby to make it easier for the parent to get out and shop!



Create a care package for an international student staying in student housing for the Christmas season. Be creative! Include books, DVDs, snacks, gift cards, gloves and hat, a fleece throw, hot chocolate mix and a big mug. If you are familiar with the country the student is from, include something that reflects that country's holiday traditions – shop online or at World Market.
